Kathi's Pastoral Reflections

A Season of Growth

My friend Scott Hafner is part of a family of winemakers in the Alexander Valley. I asked him about this year's harvest. "It's good," he said. "A little bit on the early side, because of the weather. And it will be a smaller harvest than the last couple of years."

Why? What did they do differently this year? Nothing. They're no worse at farming than they were last year, nor better. Every farmer knows that each year brings its own vicissitudes — of weather, soil conditions, insects, growth. Some years the plants produce sweet and plentiful fruit; some years they just don't. And no amount of harder work or worrying over them will make them any better. You just have to take the good years — and the bad years — as they come. You hold on, trusting that the next season will bring something new.

Maybe the same thing is true of churches.

In this church, you have seen many seasons come and go. You've had some years that felt like the church was holding on against storms of loss and hardship. You've held on when it wasn't clear what the future held. You have been faithful. You have continued to do the work of being the people of God in this place, even when it was hard to do that.

And right now we are experiencing a season of fruitfulness. There are many signs of vitality: our Sunday School and youth groups are full, worship attendance is higher than it has been in some time, our finances are solid. We could look for things we are doing differently, but it is much more truthful to just give thanks for the grace and faithfulness of God, through every season.

One of the things I am most excited about in this season of growth is the presence of three interns among us for the year.

Joshua Sulaiman, who you may already know, has begun a nine-month term as "Pastoral Intern" at Campbell UMC. He'll spend about 15 hours a week in this work, as part of his work toward a Master of Divinity degree at Pacific School of Religion and toward his own ordination. You'll see Joshua taking leadership roles alongside Pastors Kathi and Daniel in all areas of the church's life.

Joe Liverseed and Milena Lilles will be our Emerging Leader interns for this year as well. Each of them will develop a project to connect other young adults with a new church program that he/she will lead.

All three of these internship positions have been made possible by special gifts offered to the church by congregation members. I am deeply grateful. And deeply hopeful — for all that lies ahead of us.

- During the process of setting up your estate plan, be sure to include a durable power of attorney for business matters and one for health matters.


- One of the essential things in this planning is making sure you state clearly how you feel about lifeprolonging measures.


Write on the board, read the board, use it to communicate your appreciation for all the good folks who make this Campbell UMC campus and community a good place to be. 💠



The theme was "Do Love in Dulac," and Gene and Elaine Hill had theme tee shirts made. In February of 2008, our intergenerational team of 42 youth and adults spent a week working in homes in Dulac. Circuit Writer Rev. Larry LaPierre Offering Christ To The World

One of my clergy friends was remarkable in his service to God. He did not organize the church around social service programs like feeding the poor or caring for the sick. Nor did he focus exclusively on studying the Bible or sharing Holy Communion. He avoided building up his church in the eyes of his parishioners by criticizing other churches and their pastors.

He did not offer people the opportunity to join either the biggest church or the one "known" to include the "better class" of people. Nor did he inspire people to join the congregation that he led by promising them rewards either now or in the next life. He certainly did not try to make church membership easy by promising that they would not be asked to serve on committees that required any effort.

Instead, Pastor Vincent offered to each new person the opportunity to grow in faith, hope and love of God and God's people. How? With great difficulty is one answer. My colleague and friend stuttered. Nor was it a "hardly noticeable" stutter. If you have ever stuttered you know the agony that goes with having to speak to an individual or to a group. My colleague bore this burden daily.

In that way he may and St. Paul may have been similar. Some scholars believe that St. Paul had a speech impediment. Responding to his critics St. Paul wrote, "For some say, 'His letters are weighty and forceful, but in person he is unimpressive and his speaking amounts to nothing." (2 Cor. 10:10) Others suggest that

his speech problem may have been the "thorn in the flesh" that he wrote about in 2 Corinthians 12:7: "in order to keep me from becoming conceited, I was given a thorn in the flesh, a messenger of Satan, to torment me."

Whether we accept the claim that "a messenger of Satan" was given to St. Paul to "torment him," living with a speech problem would make it difficult to offer Christ to the world. How do I know? I lived with a significant speech problem for twenty years. I could not imagine enduring what my friend Pastor Vincent endured.

But God expected Pastor Vincent to serve as a pastor with his speech problem. His witness to the grace of God at work in him was powerful if not smooth and polished. God enabled Vincent to serve God by giving him a loving heart, an ability to think deeply about God's nature and the desire to share Christ with the world. Pastor Vincent and his congregation offered seekers and long-time Christian alike a church family in which Christ was proclaimed, loved and served.

There is not a person whom I have met who does not live with a problem or a burden that weighs on them. Yet none of us are necessarily prevented from loving God by our burdens or excused from serving God because of them. It remains for each follower of Christ to serve God with, and sometimes by means of, whatever burden we carry.

KINDNESS

A Nobel Peace Prize winner that Pastor Kathi McShane lifted up in her sermon on August 23, 2015, is the Dalai Lama. He is the spiritual leader of Tibetan Buddhists and is the political leader as well, now working from exile in India since 1959. His Peace Prize was awarded in 1989 for his consistent opposition to the use of violence in the Tibetan campaign for independence.

As he describes his philosophy and attitudes of compassion, he says, "My religion is very simple...My religion is kindness."

Much has been written about kindness, what it is, how to practice kindness. Something called random acts of kindness caught on for awhile. Maybe a new way to look at the practice is Intentional Acts of Kindness.

The following are some notes to myself as a Care Giver that might spark a thought/action for you.

- 1) Stop, look, observe, notice the moment and those in it with you. Be attentive to others and willing to take a detour to help.
- 2) Be willing to extend yourself. Listen to others, move toward them with a sense of caring/ serving. Diverse communities need more understanding. Do unto others as they would have done to them. Do what is needed. not just what I want to do.
- 3) Have a willingness to give of self. This might be harder work and involve a cost in serving others.

On a deeper level, you might glimpse the wholeness of others, connect with their humanity and maybe even create a spiritual bond.

Through intentional acts of kindness, compassion and true caring, transformation is possible. A little bit of kindness can grow to a become a big miracle. Want to try?

Automated External Defibrillators (AED's)

You may not know that Campbell UMC has two Automated External Defibrillators (AED's), designed to provide life-saving treatment to someone who is suffering cardiac arrest. One is installed in the Fellowship Hall; and the other, designed especially for children, is located in the Bright Days space.

A number of people in the congregation have been trained to use these devices. We hope, of course, that the need for them will never arise; but being ready to offer this kind of assistance if it is needed is one more way we can care for one another.

There are two reasons for this update at this time:

- 1. Are you willing to be trained to use the AED equipment? We could use a few more volunteers. This is a valuable way to be ready to serve this congregation and the people in it.
- 2. Some people have provided in an advance health care directive that they do not wish to be resuscitated in the event of cardiac arrest (a "DNR" provision). If you are concerned about ensuring that this directive is followed should the occasion arise while you are at the church, we are able to post such an instruction with the AED, once you have completed a written instruction.
